Ask Sir George Williams the Founder of the YMCA! Mind you a 'learned professor of distinction' agrees with my sentiments!!

Wikipedia says:-

*"An **alumni association** is an association of graduates or, more broadly, of former students (alumni). In the United Kingdom and the United States, alumni of universities, colleges, schools (especially independent schools), fraternities, and sororities often form groups with alumni from the same organization.*

These associations often organize social events, publish newsletters or magazines, and raise funds for the organization.

Many provide a variety of benefits and services that help alumni maintain connections to their educational institution and fellow graduates. In the US, most associations do not require its members to be an alumnus of a university to enjoy membership and privileges.

Additionally, such groups often support new alumni, and provide a forum to form new friendships and business relationships with people of similar background.

Alumni associations are mainly organized around universities or departments of universities, but may also be organized among students that studied in a certain country.

In the past, they were often considered to be the university's or school's old boy society (or old boys network). Today, alumni associations involve graduates of all age groups and demographics. Alumni associations are often organized into chapters by city, region, or country."

YMCA urges government to deliver 'new era for young people' ahead of General Election



With less than a month to go until the UK votes for its next government, YMCA has released its manifesto calling on political parties and candidates to deliver a new era for youth, with policies tailored to give each young person the opportunity to live their best lives.

Based on the aims and concerns of young people across England and Wales, YMCA's manifesto outlines seven primary recommendations to help improve the lives of young people and their communities.

On top of restricted housing opportunities and financial uncertainty, young people are growing up during a period where youth crime, mental health difficulties and loneliness are at an all-time high, making prospects seem hopeless. With the government's support, we can change these prospects to create a brighter future – a new era for young people.

With this in mind, recommendations in YMCA's manifesto champion the fundamental basics of what all young people deserve, from having a roof over their heads to reliable income, quality healthcare and the opportunity to contribute to their community. In order to make this a reality, YMCA is calling on the next government to:

- Ensure that in relation to Brexit, the needs and aspirations of young people are considered and protected for the future
- Substantially reinvest in youth services so that all young people have access to quality support such as youth clubs and youth workers
- Remove or minimise major barriers such as cost of rent, deposits and bills, to help ensure all young people have a home and the chance to live independently
- Review the Universal Credit system and sanctions regime to properly support young people in need, ensuring a stable income for all
- Help young people to thrive at work and provide for themselves by offering a real living wage and increasing support for entry into apprenticeship schemes
- Ease the pressure on families and offer young people the best start in life by creating a fair and sustainable childcare system for all
- Take a holistic approach to wellbeing, reducing the cost of physical activities and ensuring appropriate mental health care is in place and well resourced

Denise Hatton, Chief Executive of YMCA England & Wales, said:

“At YMCA we believe that every person should have the opportunity to live their best life. Having championed young people and communities for 175 years, we know first-hand what young people are going through and what the next government must do to in order to help them achieve this.

“Now more than ever, we need a government that will deliver for our country's young people. If we want decision makers to prioritise the interests of young people through policies that will positively impact their lives and prospects, it is imperative that their voices are heard loud and clear.

“Only with access to quality youth services, meaningful careers, financial stability, secure housing and holistic wellbeing support can a new era for youth become a reality.

“In order to make this happen we must work together. As well as calling on government, young people must also make their voices heard by registering to vote. By being informed on the policies of local candidates and having their say on polling day, young people can make an impact on the result of the election and help ensure that the decisions of the next government reflect what is best for them now and in the future.”

In addition to the manifesto, YMCAs across England and Wales will be holding hustings events over the coming weeks to engage young people in the political debate, and ensure their voices are heard in person.

Citizens of Hong Kong are increasingly concerned about the changes in legislation that threaten to decrease autonomy and independence from China. The bill that raised current concerns is the unpopular extradition legislation that means people can be extradited to China from Hong Kong and will face the legal system there. Even though the bill has been suspended, there is growing concern about China's influence over Hong Kong as 2047 approaches when Hong Kong becomes a fully fledged part of China. The protests and government response have become increasingly violent.

God, you know each person who has been impacted by these protests, every protester and every person on the police force, and so many who have born the brunt of this violence. We pray God that you will hear the cries of the people of Hong Kong, and let them be heard by leaders and those in power. Thank you for the movement of young people who are standing up for their future. We pray for peace and for no harm to come to fellow humans. We lament for every life that has been threatened and lost during this time.

A failing economy, inadequate services and a hope for change that has not been realised, has led to a surge of protests that has gripped the nation in the past weeks. The protests are non-sectarian and country wide, and while linked to the looming economic crisis as well as historic corruption, legislation that protects the ruling class, and basic services not being accessible to so many, were triggered by an increase of taxes on some goods like tobacco, gasoline and online phone systems like WhatsApp. Last month Prime Minister Saad Hariri resigned in response to protesters' demands.

God, we pray for the people of Lebanon at this time. We pray that leaders from various sectors will be united in recognising the need for change and better management of public funds that will impact on the vulnerable. We pray that you will protect all those involved in the protests, and bring the change that is so desperately sought after by men and women hoping for a better future. We ask that you bring resolution to the status quo and hear the cries of those protesting. Let religious leaders rise up, God, and lead towards lasting peace and change in this turbulent time.

When subway fares were increased in Santiago during October, secondary school students started protesting by a coordinated fare evasion, which lead to confrontations with the police force. Protests and riots expanded to other cities and now hundreds of thousands of Chileans are protesting decades of poverty and inequality, poor healthcare and privatisation of pensions, and the cost of living. Around 20 people have died to date, some by fires started, some during looting, and some by police. Human Rights Organisations state that more than 220 people have had their eyes badly affected by chemicals such as tear gas used by Security forces.

God, we lament with our brothers and sisters from Chile over the loss of lives during these protests. We mourn with Chile as we witness the level of violence resulting in deaths. We pray for systemic change to come to Chile that will release its citizens from the struggle of increased costs of living and inequality that is considered 'normal'. We pray for a decrease in violence as the government responds so these protests. We pray for the thousands who have been arrested and ask for their protection.

Jim Wilson 1920 – 2019.



All Saints Botley on October 4th was full for the memorial service for Jim. With tributes from 4 family members, 2 long standing Fairthorne involved men, the Hamble Valley Rotary President and 2 church members. With some enthralling memories of Jim's exploits and commitment to the many projects he supported, including being on ladders and roofs of the church and Market hall in his 80's!

Jim was born in 1920. His parents - a Prison Officer and a Singer. According to members of his church All Saints Botley he didn't inherit his mother's genes!. He gained a scholarship to Christ's hospital school near Horsham "doing fairly well". In the late 30's he was employed at a company in Wiltshire that produced scientific instruments and whilst there joined the TA. He was called up at the outbreak of war at the age of 19 and like many young men those 6 years shaped him.

He joined up to the Royal Wiltshire Yeomanry a cavalry regiment which shipped all 600 horses to Palestine where he rode around on a horse (with a sword) which was swapped for a camel for a while but Jim always said he was not fond of them! His unit was then mechanised with all sorts of vehicles.

While driving a scout car his unit were sent on a breakneck mission to get to Tehran asap! His company were told to stop at nothing and put the pedal to the metal! 100 men in 10 or so light vehicles on their own out in the desert ahead of everyone else. In the middle of nowhere they came upon an Iranian army roadblock.

Out of a swanky low slung American saloon car stepped a very short general covered with so many medals he could barely stand who wouldn't let them pass unless they accepted the surrender of the Persian army, who didn't want to be captured by the Russians. At a nearby base the surrender of over 15,000 Iranian troops, was accepted, who were made to put all their guns in one big pile and told to stay put! Jim and his company carried on their mission to get to Tehran as soon as they could and before the Russians who were coming down from the North. Whoever got there first got the city!

Apparently they ended up arriving at about the same time as the Russians ... there was apparently 2 days of wild party then the order came down - 'no fraternising'! Later they were equipped with tanks and fought across N Africa in some of the big tank battles. Jim was blown up at Metera Ridge near Alemein

Jim transferred to the Intelligence corps serving in the Middle East, Sicily then Bletchley House where the Enigma code was cracked. By this stage he was a Sergeant and led a wireless intercept unit of 30 men on D Day +2 and followed the front line across France, Belgium and Holland They were just behind the front line all the way and listen in on German messages and sent them back to Bletchley to be cracked overnight.

He was finally demobbed in 1946 and on his discharge papers - in the reference section his CO had written 'A reliable, conscientious and intelligent worker who applies himself diligently to any task he undertakes' and then 'exemplary'.

Despite this Jim had confesses that he was a little lost after the war. He tried farming for a while apparently at different farms but didn't really enjoy it. Richard - Jim's stepson (whose tribute much of this is summarised) shared that he found "various bits of paper" while sorting through Jim's effects. One revealed that (unusually) at the age of about 40 he took an aptitude test!

The results are rather odd; the person reviewing said, "if you were 18 then based on your results, I would suggest a career as a radiologist! But as you are 40 ... I would suggest something like outward bound!!" He didn't talk about this time but it is presumed that was how Jim ended up at Fairthorne Manor working as the canoeing instructor, graduating to Director.

Just some of Jim's achievements - In his early years as Canoe Instructor he took a group of young canoeists to demonstrate the game they were playing in the mill pond on the Hamble. Canoe Polo at Crystal Palace from where it has become an international sport.

He invented the "mobile large 10 person tents", which were erected on pallet bases, so could be easily moved by a tractor with a forklift attachment by one person in a matter of minutes. A vast improvement on the previous - dismantle the tent, pack it up to move it and re-pitch it again - requiring a "gang of staff" and much time.

Ron Ingamells has previously said that Jim was somewhat reluctant when he approached him in the early 80's for Fairthorne to host the first YMCA Eurocross in 1982. After some consideration he whole heartedly gave his support and backing. Pembroke house - those large terrapin buildings brought up from South Wales provided additional accommodation.

The Canoe Lake - created Jim once told me by an "Irishman with a digger" provided a safe venue for beginners, not reliant on the tides of the river. His endless support of:- Botley Youth Club, where he first met Muriel his wife of over 50 years; and of course, the Hamble Valley Rotary Club.

Perhaps Jim's greatest Fairthorne satisfaction was the instigation of The Young Carers Festival held every year at Fairthorne for several thousand young carers.

The Minister who gave the address spoke of the Dash - between 1920 (&) 2019 being the life Jim lived using 1 Corinthians 13 vs 4 -8 & 13 to explain that the 16 elements of Love St Paul writes typified Jim. Humbling.
