
Our meeting started with our usual around the table update from each of us attending. This was followed by a report from Jim Thomson on the Europe YMCA Refugee meeting held in Holland.

It was the letter received from Peter Brookes (copy within) that started me thinking of how far apart many of us feel from the YMCA Movement which many of us served most of, if not all our working lives (and some are still serving in retirement) and how that bond that we have as YMCA Secretaries remains a valued part of who we are, through Y's Retired of UK. It would be good to know if this common sense of belonging was still engendered and growing and was evident within the YMCA in UK today.

However what I do read is the sad demise of APS and therefore the structural part it played for CEOs and all staff, the eradication of regional staff and Executive Regional Councils and those important monthly or bi monthly gatherings of staff we used to call Fraternals.

The result of this demise is the recognition that those leaving the Y or retiring from the Y, joining the Y's Retired of UK, will continue to diminish just as is happening within other national groups elsewhere in our YMCA world fraternity.

Our world, as we knew it, the fellowship and oneness within our YMCA work with colleagues, was tangible and valued. But now, it seems there is little or no contact between those in post and those retired. At least, in the USA the YMCA Hall of Fame in America ensures YMCA retired folk are not forgotten.


A standing room only crowd congratulated the six individuals who were present of the class of 12, a mix of historical and contemporary volunteers and staff who have served the national and international YMCA movement.
