With the coming of spring and the arrival of Easter, our thoughts inevitably turn to new life and resurrection. From my office window I can see the flower bed that was once a tangle of bamboo now blooming with spring flowers and the trees which have been so skeleton like all during winter are becoming green again. This is the joy, luxury and benefit of where we live. Spring has sprung as we have expected it to.

By contrast, as we look at Gaza or any number of Ukrainian cities the views are of demolition, destruction and suffering. Rather than being filled with optimism and joy, our feelings can easily turn to despair as we see such sights and feel for those for whom this is their daily reality. We ask 'where is the hope of new life to be found here?'

The answer has to be in our faith in Jesus Christ whose death and resurrection constantly reminds us that all things are possible in Him and through Him. Ten members were able to gather on Zoom on 21st March for this year's AGM. The meeting remembered those who had died in the last year: Bob Brunswick, Jim Thompson, Elaine Hunt and Walter Crosby (Former YMCA Scotland Treasurer) who had died during the previous week.

Reports from The President, Secretary, Treasurer and WFYS and Secours Speciaux Representative previously circulated were received. Grateful note was made of the revamped website and e mail address organised by Andy Winter.

The budget was agreed including provision being made over the next two years for UK representation at the World Council and WFYS meetings in Toronto in 2026 and support for a fund to assist members from needy countries to attend. It was agreed that £1000 be also provided from the Trust fund for Secours Speciaux which has been renamed the staff assistance fund.

Discussions were had concerning attracting new members. Everyone was encouraged to use their personal contacts to invite new people to join. It was also agreed to explore a renaming of Y's Retired to more fully express our broad-based membership of former staff and volunteers across the British Isles. Lifelong service is not a requirement!

Continuing Val Wallis' "skip" through her 50 years plus YMCA Experience shared with those of us at the Cambridge lunch in 2023.

We finished last time with ~ **Roy Holgate was to become a huge influence in my life always encouraging me to step out of my comfort zone and not to do an auto reject on opportunities - however scary they may look.**

Roy encouraged me to stand for National Board and so another experience began. It was a board of 70 members I seem to remember a couple of women representing the Woman's auxiliary, although there were a couple of young men. Then I reached the highest point any woman had ever travelled in the YMCA, the National Executive. I have a letter from Ronnie Howe to say they were sure I had made history. They could not remember anyone giving apologies for a National Board meeting because they were elsewhere giving birth.

I also have a letter from Stan Charlesworth National Secretary at the time congratulating me on the safe arrival of Amanda Jane and when my parenting duties had eased, they would look forward to welcoming me back.

When I arrived with Amanda on my lap a couple of meetings later, I was greeted with "I know we want to lower the age of the National Executive, but this is ridiculous."

We took Amanda to two National Assemblies sharing sessions with childcare. This raised the issue of young Mum's attending events and for some years crèche facilities were provided at Assemblies.

It was again Roy that encouraged me to become chair of Maidstone YMCA, the first female to hold that position.

That was a brilliant 6 years stepping very much into a new role and gaining knowledge all the way, handling big issues, big decisions, hiring and firing, meeting and greeting. A wonderful experience. I often found as one piece of a work came to an end a new opportunity opened and as my time at Maidstone finished a new task was offered. Tunbridge Wells YMCA were in difficulties and the board was at a point of collapse. The Regional Council put in a holding committee which I joined. That was back to the grey suited brigade, a group of businessmen more interested in playing Cricket than running a YMCA. It was at one of these meeting when they were talking about buying a Hoover and it was suggested that as the only woman perhaps, I could advise them. I said I had never bought a Hoover and was still using the one I had as a wedding present. I eventually became Chair of Tunbridge Wells establishing a new board and a new Chief Executive which gave a strong foundation for Tunbridge Wells to flourish, now West Kent YMCA

Even by now I was still apprehensive about speaking in public and when asked to do a vote of thanks at a National YMCA Assembly, I think it was 1989 it was a very nervous walk to the podium. On my return with a lump in my throat I said, silently to my long-suffering speech therapist of my childhood years Mrs. Zee, "you would have been proud of what we achieved".

Unbeknown to me at the time an officer said to John Naylor, National Secretary, "there goes our next vice chair."

Roy had asked me twice to stand as Vice Chair of the National Council and my answer both times had been "don't be silly, they're male, businessmen, have money and connections I'm just a mum and a housewife". He had given me a quote from Lech Walensa the Polish dock worker who had become Polish President. This man had spoken of his total sense of being overwhelmed and the realization that what is needed sometimes is a bit of ordinary.

When approached by Roy a third time and John Naylor I felt a bit like Peter in the Garden of Gethsemane denying our Lord three time and feeling perhaps I ought to just listen to what I was being asked to do.

I was duly elected, the first female officer of the YMCA and that began the most challenging, demanding, frustrating, dealing with things I would never have thought possible time. I met some fabulous people, I travelled the length and breadth of the country, I visited Greece and Germany. There were many posh events and Royal occasions, I wore ball gowns I wore wellies. I opened new buildings, new housing projects and attended quite a few dedication services. I chaired National Assemblies, I attended European Assemblies, I chaired Inter Council Committees. The icing on the cake, an absolute joy and a privilege to be Vice Chair throughout 1994 our 150th celebrations year.

When my 5 years game to an end it left a gap in my life.

The 4th installment of Val's 50 plus years of her YMCA Journey is for next time.

The engine works, the Brakes and Clutch have been repaired, the bodywork requires restoration as well as the woodwork in the back of the van which has woodworm. The van will be kept on loan at the Yorkshire Air Museum, and it could well be used for serving refreshments again depending on Health & Safety requirements.
