A 2018 annual report will be sent once the World Alliance of YMCAs year end audit is completed. Again, many thanks for your continued support of your fellow Y staff and retirees worldwide.

MORE SNIPPETS FROM SHARED CHRISTMAS NEWSLETTERS

On 16th May, Janet's birthday, Norman went out for his daily ride whilst Janet was at the gym, both of them looking forward to all the celebrations later in the day. Unfortunately, he was on a narrow road doing fifteen miles an hour, when two cars passed him forcing his bike onto a crumbling surface and into a gully, where it was impossible to extricate himself. He fell heavily into the road, with his bike on top of him and his cycle shoes still in the pedal cleats.

He fell on his right hip, where he had an artificial hip – very painful!! He got up as quickly as he could to avoid oncoming traffic and climbed back on to his bike and slowly rode home. However, it was subsequently discovered that he had broken his pelvis in several places, and he finally ended up in Southmead Trauma hospital in Bristol.

A few days later he underwent a five and a half hour operation when the surgical team repaired his pelvis with lots of metal and numerous screws and fitted a replacement hip joint. The very next day he was standing and able to walk with crutches. A week later he left and began six months recovery.

Janet is now the Secretary to the Church and they are both heavily involved with the activities and redevelopment. She is also volunteering with Age UK and is involved with a Mental Health training programme. Norman is the Chairman of the Trowbridge Health Centre (33,000 patients) Patients Participation Group. He is a member of the Keevil Fun Committee and the Drama Group. He will be wearing his 'dress' as a Server in several church services during the month.
