GREETINGS FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear friends and colleagues greetings

Dear David

We were very grateful that you were able to let us have early news of the passing of Sam Johnston and Alex Cloke. Sadly, February became a month of sad news for us, having heard of the passing of six people, including a family member.

Accordingly, we were unable to get to Sam's Celebration of Life Service, but Lenny Allen was able to represent West Bromwich YMCA (now YMCA Black Country) where Sam remained a Vice President. Sam came to West Bromwich from Liverpool YMCA around 1967 when the John Lees House building, with 70 single study bedrooms, was just above foundation level. The Sports Hall was then built and the new complex was officially opened in April 1970.

On the 5th April 1973 the foundation stone for the self catering residential block, Cadbury House was laid as phase 3 of the overall plan, with 48 Self Catering Units. These were the first purpose built Self-Catering Units for YMCA's to be constructed in Great Britain at a cost of £120,000.

These same buildings have been refurbished and extended during the last 12 months to create a multi million pound Western Gateway development into West Bromwich.

We have many good memories of Sam's time in West Bromwich and were pleased he was able to continue as a Vice President

In 1978 Sam moved to be regional Secretary in Anglia before moving to London to become National Secretary.

He was a Methodist Local Preacher and also served as a Magistrate in West Bromwich and Cambridge.

We were able to speak to Maureen by telephone and she outlined to us how Sam had lived so positively with cancer for over 20 years.

We look forward to keeping in touch through the Y's retired network.

WEST BROMWICH YMCA NOW CALLED YMCA BLACK COUNTRY

Pride as £9.5 million YMCA building unveiled. A new £9.5 million YMCA centre has been unveiled in the Black Country – seven years after building work started.

The facility in Carter's Green is home to 96 housing units for vulnerable adults, a £200,000 gym, youth zone, fitness and wellbeing centre and enterprise, business and education facilities.

Work on the site started in 2008. Parts of the old building have been refurbished and new parts have also been built. It also features a new not-for-profit coffee shop called Cielo, who has been co-founded by Linda and Nick Castle. The first phase of the YMCA Western Gateway scheme was completed in September 2011 which saw the Children and Family Centre Nursery opened.

Steve Clay, chief executive officer at YMCA Black Country, said: "It feels fantastic that the work has finally been completed after what has been a long journey which has involved many twists and turns.

"We have attempted to offer a wide variation of top of the range services in a friendly environment.

"We had three aims with this transformation – to completely revamp the community services we offer, for the quality of that service to be high in every aspect of what we do and for the building to be iconic, catch people's attention and utilise its location as a gateway into the town centre. I'm very happy to say we've more than achieved all three goals."

The YMCA has operated in West Bromwich for more than 127 years. Its first premises were built in St Michael Street in 1888 before relocating to Carter's Green in the 1960s. Clive Jessup, whose company Jessup Brothers helped complete the building work, said: "Jessup became involved in the eleventh hour of the scheme but as soon as I saw this opportunity I knew it had the team to deliver.

"We would like to thank all the local suppliers as this absolutely amazes me. It really is a collaboration and a thank you to all the hard work everybody has done. "YMCA have been a very helpful and understanding client. "If this transformation doesn't inspire the people of West Bromwich, then I don't know what will."

Hut was an entertaining godsend to Crowborough troops during WW1

THE Waterloo hut was a YMCA canteen which was a godsend to the thousands of troops who were encamped at Crowborough during the First World War.

It stood on the corner of Crowborough Hill and Croham Road – a long wooden building surrounded by a rickety paling fence. Even after the end of the war the Waterloo Hut continued to serve the wider community of Crowborough. It was the venue for whist drives, dances, concerts, and even for film shows, in competition with the Picture House in Croft Road.

The hut was large enough to accommodate all the people who normally attended these events. But it was too small for the numbers who turned up for a Conservative-inspired show in January, 1926.

'Mrs Jarley's Political Waxworks' drew so many Tory supporters that, as the Kent and Sussex Courier reported, "the hut was crowded to its utmost capacity and large numbers were unable to gain admission".

The entertainment, inspired by the Dickensian proprietress of a travelling show, was organised by the Crowborough branch of the Women's Conservative Association. The stage had to be enlarged because of the size of the cast, but the reporter noted that "the lighting and scenic effects were utilised to good effect".

"They were surrounded by a number of living beings – all local residents – who were garbed in appropriate costumes representing the Dominions and other integral parts of the British Empire in addition to Russia and Germany.

"They seldom uttered a word. but acted as though they were actually made of wax, and contained within their frames a mechanism to make the figures move artificially".

"Each waxwork was introduced by Mrs Jarley, who at times interspersed her remarks with personal testimonies. The models were made to work, showing how John Bull and his children were given their daily wants, but the Communist Party interfered with the mechanism, with the result that the wrong effect was produced.

At the end the audience sang Land Of Hope And Glory (what else?) and this was followed by "a beautiful tableau of Britannia surrounded by her dominions, and the singing of Rule, Britannia."

So the curtain fell on Mrs Jarley and her waxworks. After the hut was demolished the site was vacant for some years. In 1962 Crowborough's first purpose-built library was opened there, and years later the building became the Town Hall.

MINUTES OF THE Y'S RETIRED OF UK EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE - MARCH 2016

1. PARTICIPANTS:

Jim Lamb (President), Ray Allen (Honorary Treasurer), Rupert George, David Miller, Keith Rennie, David Smith (Newsletter / Website Editor), Reg Wake, Vic Hills (Secretary).

2. PROCESS:

Documents had been circulated electronically to all participants for consideration and comment. The matters identified were subsequently approved and received with unanimous support.

3. MINUTES OF THE 2015 AGM:

As previously circulated were approved and filed in the Minute Book for reference.

4. MATTERS ARISING:

The following were approved:

The appointment of Keith Rennie as the duly appointed Scottish Group representative to the Executive as agreed by the Scottish Group in May 2015 was ratified with pleasure.

5. PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

As previously published in The March Newsletter and circulated was warmly received and appended to the minutes. Jim was thanked for leading Y's Retired through the year, guiding, and stirring our grey matters' in his President's Letter. Plus representing Y's Retired as appropriate at services to celebrate the lives of those now departed and convening one of the regional gatherings.

6. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS 2015:

Copies of the Audited Statements were circulated, and received with approval and appended to the minutes. Appreciation was expressed and recorded to David Bennison for his continued voluntary Auditing services.

7. TREASURER'S REPORT:

Appreciation was expressed to Honorary Treasurer Ray Allen for his quiet efficiency who continues to oil the wheels of our obligations and intentions and ensuring that Y's Retired is able to service those with the money required. His report which had been circulated raised the following items which were approved:

- 2015 had seen a slight surplus of £330.00, maintaining a balance of £3117.94.
- 83 members paid their subscriptions in 2015, a decrease by 2 since 2014, although 3 new members had joined. 76 paid by Standing Order.
- Contributions to Secours Speciaux of £1095 included the missed subvention from 2014 (as noted last year) of £200, plus 2015 of £200.
- The subvention of £100 to the World Fellowship of YMCA's Retirees was delayed by the bank and has been provided for payment in 2016. Had the £100 been paid the surplus would be £230.00.
- Expenses this year only came to £30 which was the administration fee for the transfer of the Secours Speciaux donation.
- Donations of £260 to the Trust Fund and a donation of £50 to the General Fund.

8. BUDGET 2016:

- Secours Speciaux donation to remain at £200,
- World Fellowship of Y's Retired donation to remain at £100.
- Administration £300 (doubled part of the reason being the 'subs' increase 1st Jan 2016,
- Trust Fund budget to remain the same at £250,
- The implementation of the new Subscription of £20 as from 1st January 2016, moved by the President and seconded by the Executive Secretary was ratified.

9. MEMBERSHIP:

The Executive Secretary was warmly thanked for his efficient handling of the Y's Retired of the UK affairs over the year under review. his report included:

Reg' Wake was thanked for his continuing contact on our behalf with Secours Speciaux and WFYR and noted with pleasure the reports summarised at item 12.

The Member's Register varied from that minuted last year; (2014 - 130 plus spouses), to 2015 – 128 plus spouses. There are 10 lay members, 6 overseas and 4 "courtesy" contacts re WFYR and Secours Speciaux.

10. NEWSLETTER/WEBSITE:

David Smith and Sue (his wordsmith) for eight years as editor of the Y's Retired of UK newsletter (which they compile, publish and distribute six bi-monthly Newsletters per year), were especially thanked for their work. Now nearing its 50th edition which keeps the membership (and other interested parties from far and wide) informed of current affairs affecting the YMCA Movement, comments from colleagues and friends. Occasionally member's share where they are in their retirement, (David would like more, - so would we who read the Newsletter!). David asks "please do share with us any new adventures you have undertaken or experiences that have become part of your daily routine'; I would love to hear from you and perhaps have a jpeg picture so that others can remember the smiling face which is yours. Just send to: ses.dhs@hotmail.co.uk

As in previous reports, David commented "there has always been an emphasis on communication. In each bi-monthly Newsletter there are details of the website which is regularly updated: www.yretired.co.uk All the past and present Newsletters are featured on it, under the heading "Newsletter Archive." The Memorial pictures are featured there in all their glory".

David has been the conduit of information and notices of members and friends who have died. International colleagues who are part of the World Federation of Y's Retired (WFYR), received our UK news and voiced their gratitude, with some articles being highlighted in "Bridges," the WFYR quarterly Newsletter. Thanks were recorded to South & Central Herts YMCA, the CEO Guy Foxell, and Lorraine Stocken for their willingness, time and help, to print and distribute hard copy versions (for those not on email) which without their co-operation would not be distributed. South & Central Herts YMCA kindly fulfil this task as their donation to Y's Retired, which enabled the Officers to allocate a higher annual proportion of funds to Secours Speciaux.

11. SCOTLAND REPORT: Keith Rennie's report.

- a) At the end of December 2015 we have a group of 24 of which 21 are Retired Secretaries and 3 retired YMCA Office bearers.
- b) The first meeting of the year was held a Broughty Ferry YMCA 7th May with 9 attending. We had our normal informal round the table chat and a short business meeting when we looked at Y's Retired UK accounts and agreed the annual fee being raised to £20. Concern was expressed at the large balance in the Secours Speciaux account. Speakers included, Kerry Reilly Scottish National Secretary & her vision for the future; Jim Thompson spoke on the 40th anniversary of The Fall of Saigon and the work of the Saigon YMCA and the Chairman of Broughty Ferry YMCA.
- c) The second meeting was held in Perth on 3rd October at the invitation of YMCA Scotland who were holding their Annual Business Meeting that day. Regrettably only 5 attended and heard Paul Smillie who had been invited by YMCA Scotland talk about YMCA Pension Scheme. This was followed by meeting a group of young people from all over Scotland who were looking at the history of the Scottish Movement and were keen to hear of our involvement with the YMCA. This was followed by the National Annual Business meeting where our group's members Stewart McCrae, Keith McIntosh and Keith Rennie were presented with the George Williams Medal for their long service with the YMCA. The Rev. Colin Mcaulay's application as a member nominated director to the YMCA Trustee Company was accepted. It is good to know that we now have two members of Y's Retired of the UK looking after our interests.
- d) There were 3 bereavements recorded during the year.

12. SECOURS SPECIAUX (SS) and WORLD FELLOWSHIP OF Y's RETIRED (WFYR):

Reg's report provided a historical scenario of SS (which is included for newer members):- "the majority of older retires will have been familiar with SS purposes, perhaps as far back as BSA/AOS conferences of the 50's/60's but especially so since the foundation of the World Fellowship of YMCA Retirees (WFYR) in 1994 when it was resolved that support for SS be a priority goal.

As foundation members of WFYR, such priority was readily adopted by the Y's Retired committee and is current. Through time, annual subventions on general funds and later, approval for a levy of 50% on membership subscriptions, provided a pattern of contribution to SS which continues. Additionally, occasional special appeals, for example to subsidise travel for delegates to WFYR and/or World Council gatherings, have been well supported by our membership at large".

Extracts from Bonnie Mairs (SS committee chair] report from The World Emergency Fund Meeting are included below:

- 1," In 2014, six national YMCA movements contributed to the Secours Speciaux fund. Donors were Canada, UK, Germany, the Phillipines and the USA. Part of the Scottish YMCA's contribution was in memory of John Knox. Grants totalled 5,118 Swiss Francs, The year balance was 362,888.80 SF.
- 2. "The fund has no expenses; the World Alliance covers the staff time, bank charges and occasional conference calls.",
- 3. "The committee has received heartfelt 'thank you' letters from YMCA retirees who have received grants. We do not publish the names of recipients in order to respect their privacy."
- 4." Donors may ask why we seek funds when the fund has a positive balance. It is impossible to predict need. In a recent year we made grants of 90,000 SF. The World Council meeting agreed to maintain a minimum of 250,000 SF in the fund and try to increase it. I think we are doing quite well, though we would like to increase the number of national movements supporting the fund."
- 5."The SS committee is very much aware that inadequate retirement provision is one of the reasons we receive requests for emergency support. Retirees concerned simply cannot manage any emergency".
- 6. "The committee agreed the fund will allocate up to 30% of its assets for requests that are strictly retirement issues, such as a onetime grant at retirement for someone with no pension. The balance of the fund, at least 70% of the assets, will be used for "traditional" emergencies. The majority of requests are for medical emergencies but we have responded to other cases caused by death, natural disaster or national political or economic crisis. "
- 7. "Special thanks to the donor YMCAs and individuals who have made contributions. You are helping your colleagues who have worked for years for the YMCA, as you have. Because of circumstances beyond their control, they find themselves in need, and we are fortunate in being able to respond. Your gifts are helping your brothers and sisters in their retirement. On their behalf, I thank you."

13. Any Other Business. None were reported.

ALEX CLOKE 5TH MARCH 2016



I am sure we all have a story to tell about Alex Cloke. He was that kind of guy.

So can I ask you to share your story with Pat. Not today but go home and write it down, post or email is fine. You see I want Alex's much loved grandchildren to know much more of the man whose DNA is theirs, to know more of the man who loved them and prayed for them, spoke often to me of his hopes for them.

On occasions like this we often leave amazed that we knew so little about a man we thought we knew so well. Only Jesus knows us as we really are and still loves unconditionally and without restraint. And so it is with Alex.

Did you know that Alex had the Status, not rank, of a Lieutenant Colonel in the British Army. Why? Because Alex had strategy responsibility for over 20 YMCA Unit serving our troops in BAOR plus two centres serving our guys in Cyprus. Flying Air Troops out of RAF Brize Norton was all part of the job. If time could permit I could tell you of adventures with Alex in New York, Chicago, East Berlin, Chile, London Central YMCA, glorious Guildford and beyond.

Alex was Chair of the British Urban Group often referred to as the BUG group. This prestigious gathering of the Chief Officers drawn from the 25 largest YMCA's across 5 nations was hosted by Alex twice a year at his much loved Dunford House, at one time another of his responsibilities.

On occasions we were invited to attend gathering of our peers drawn from a across the world. The YMCA is the world's largest NGO active in over 90 countries serving well over 125 million people a year. Our first conference was East Berlin. I can tell you we felt privileged to be invited to attend.

Alex asked me to arrange cheap transport. Our unmarked plane took off from a small airfield in England. Flown by a crew from Uzbekistan cabin service was a mars bar and a can of coke. Today we would call it Ryan Air. We landed closer to the Polish border than Berlin. My companions Alan Chick and Graham Hobbs complained about our journey but Alex remarked, when hearing how cheap the return deal was, 'You know, this budget transport could catch on'.

Seriously he could read the signs of the times.... "Two men look through prison bars, one sees the mud the other the stars." Alex saw the diamonds in the mud, he saw what you, me, us, could be in Christ, he saw potential when others saw write offs. He saw opportunities brilliantly disguised as insoluble problems.

Anyway we got to our hotel in East Berlin. Whist the rest of us were checking our rooms Alex was checking the guest list. Over supper he informed us that it would be wise to miss the evening session and meet a stranger at the bar.

You see Alex had met Tony Martino, the CEO of one of the largest YMCA Operations in the United States and in a few moments had not only ascertained Tony's interest in developing social housing across North America but Alex had convinced him that his college from England were the YMCA's leading experts on special needs housing for young people at risk. Well we thought we were anyway.

Four months later Graham Hobbs, Manchester YMCA, Alan Chick St Helens and me from YMCA Norfolk left for New York and Chicago YMCA's. This time we flew Virgin Air. Alex was taking no chances.

Ladies and Gentlemen...you get to know a person if you have to sleep with them. The New York YMCA was a challenging environment. Alan shared a room with Graham so I had Alex. The only man I know who, after his evening devotions snored in tongues. In this New York YMCA, sharing a room was for protection not for convenience. The Night Manager suggested if you wanted the toilet in the middle of the night (the loos were at the end of the corridor) go with a friend never on your own. It's in situations like that that you learn who to trust.

Chicago YMCA was completely different. First class hotel, excellent food, tight business like schedule, up at 5.50, swim (by the way Alex was a Championship swimmer in his youth) shower, then breakfast then the car arrived at 7am. By the third day we were exhausted.

Then on the last night a most amazing thing happened. We were taken by our host to an upmarket, high heeled, down town bar. Dripping with beautiful people. We were shown to exclusive seats behind the red rope all of us except Alex. We had lost him!!

Soon we heard him down at the Bar High Fiving it with cool guys shaking hands with the in crowd. Eventually he returned to our bewildered table still with his orange juice in hand. Explanations were demand.

The guys at the bar were night club owners from Guildford and very, very surprised to see Alex and not a little embarrassed to know that GOD had sent a guiding angel from England to remind them that our Lord is all seeing. There were good times and there were hard times.

YMCA ministry is and should be front line, boundary pushing, fighting, not just flesh and blood but powers and authorities, often the Housing Corporation, the Department of Employment, the Criminal Justice System as well as the drug pushers and predators.

And in any battle there are casualties. Alex asked me if I had any super skilled, courageous and committed workers looking to progress professionally. I gave him my best, Nick Stanley. Alex wept telling me how Nick had been killed on YMCA duty stabbed by a resident. Alex knew that you spell FAITH as RISK.

Alex could find inspiration in the darkest of places. Supporting Bob Metcalf gloriously dying of cancer yet still striving to finish the rebuild of Lakeside YMCA so that others could find a safe sanctuary and rediscover the grace of Christ to forgive themselves and return unto HIS service.

Alex was canny with money. He even demanded his \$1 Senior Citizen discount on the New York ferry. How embarrassing. Yet he invested recklessly of his time, his prayers, his energy and all that he had in those he was called to serve, residents, the homeless, the jobless, the young offender, his staff. Ladies and Gentlemen, if that is the only investment that pays out on earth and guarantees a return in heaven, then Alex is quid's in.

SECOURS SPECIAUX AND WFYR

Scenario:

The majority of older retirees will have been familiar with SS purposes, perhaps as far back as BSA/AOS conferences of the 50's/60'sbut especially so since the foundation of the World Fellowship of YMCA Retirees (WFYR) in 1994 when it was resolved that support for SS be a priority goal. As foundation members of WFYR, such priority was readily adopted by the Y's Retired committee and is current. Through time, annual subventions on general funds and later, approval for a levy of 50% on membership subscriptions, provided a pattern of contribution to SS which continues. Additionally, occasional special appeals, for example to subsidise travel for delegates to WFYR and/or World Council gatherings, have been well supported by our membership at large.

For sums transferred to World Council for SS, see audited Statement of Accounts for our last financial year.

Update: (Extracts from latest report of World Alliance Emergency Fund (SS) per Bonnie Mairs (SS committee chair]

- 1," In 2014, six national YMCA movements contributed to the Secours Speciaux fund. The donors were Canada, UK, Germany, the Phillipines and the USA. Part of the Scottish YMCA's contribution was in memory of John Knox. The fund made grants totalling 5,118 Swiss Francs. The year balance was 362,888.80 SF.
- 2. "The fund has no expenses charged against its balance as the World Alliance covers the staff time, bank charges and occasional conference calls.",
- 3. "The committee has received heartfelt 'thank you' letters from YMCA retirees who have received grants. We do not publish the names of recipients in order to respect their privacy."
- 4." Donors may ask why we seek funds when the fund has a positive balance. It is impossible to predict need. In a recent year we made grants of 90,000 SF. At the World Council meeting in the USA, the Secretary General advised the SS committee to continue to maintain a minimum of 250,000 SF in the fund and to try to increase it, I think we are doing quite well, though we would like to increase the number of national movements supporting the fund."
- 5."The SS committee is very much aware that inadequate retirement provision is one of the reasons we receive requests for emergency support. Retirees concerned simply cannot manage any emergency".
- 6." The committee has agreed that the fund will allocate up to 30% of its assets for requests that are strictly retirement issues. such as a onetime grant at retirement for someone with no pension. The balance of the fund, at least 70% of the assets, will be used for "traditional" emergencies. The majority of requests are for medical emergencies but we have responded to other cases caused by death, natural disaster or national political or economic crisis.
- 7."Special thanks to the donor YMCAs and individuals who have made contributions. You are helping your colleagues who have worked for years for the YMCA, as you have. Because of circumstances beyond their control, they find themselves in need, and we are fortunate in being able to respond. Your gifts are helping your brothers and sisters in their retirement. On their behalf, I thank you."

Conference Statement

Approximately 70 YMCA leaders from 16 countries met from 11.-13. March 2016 in the Netherlands to exchange experiences in their work with young refugees, asylum seekers, internally displaced persons and migrants in their countries, and to explore new initiatives and new projects for future years.

This conference was a joint initiative of YMCA Europe (www.ymcaeurope.com) and YMCA of the Netherlands (www.ymca.nl).

The YMCA (Young Men's Christian Association) in Europe is an inclusive ecumenical Christian organization where young people can grow and develop in body, mind and spirit. It works in more than 45 countries in Europe.

In the context of this work the primary focus of the YMCA is in the work with children and young people.

Conference delegates recognize that:

- wars and other global challenges are increasing tension in Europe and in the world. This leads to many young people searching for safe places and a better future.
- this causes large scale migration, that will continue for many years, asking for an increased response from society.
- young refugees and asylum seekers arriving in new societies are a special vulnerable group that requires specific attention.
- the YMCA has a longstanding tradition and a good reputation in its work with and for refugees and asylum seekers.
- the YMCA is available and willing to deliver support in emergency situations and helping refugees, asylum seekers and internally displaced persons to integrate in societies in Europe, and support them in building a new
- National governments are inclined to see refugees and asylum seekers as a "logistical" issue and that the YMCA can deliver complementary support to develop young refugees and asylum seekers to become European citizens and full members of their new societies.

Therefore the participants in this conference recommend:

- YMCAs in Europe to join forces in developing programmes for young refugees, asylum seekers and internally displaced persons to stimulate integration in the different countries.
- to create spaces in order to enable co-operation, sharing experiences and developing new initiatives across Europe.
- YMCAs in Europe, in coordination with YMCA Europe and YMCA World to make representation to European institutions, the United Nations and other relevant agencies to offer support in assisting young refugees and asylum seekers across Europe.
- YMCA Europe to develop project proposals together with the National YMCAs in Europe, to be delivered by national and local YMCAs.
- that YMCA Europe advocates on issues expressed in this statement.

Each of us have different images of Sam for he was a friend to all and to my knowledge enemy of none!

It was my good fortune to enter the service of the YMCA as a career at the same time as Sam and if I were to add the years of full time service and the years since retirement with membership of the Y's Retired of the UK it comes to about 40 years of knowing Sam Johnston not just as a colleague but as a person. We never lived in each-others pockets as close friends as the saying goes but we always maintained a valuable relationship and apart from the annual conferences plus numerous other YMCA meetings I refer to one in particular!
