GREETINGS FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear friends and colleagues. Greetings

Recently I have been looking at the different kinds of 'Retired Groups' associated with the World Fellowship of YMCA Retirees (WFYR) and noted how the traits of individual National YMCAs (worldwide) vary in their approach to retired staff and lay persons through their respective reports recorded in the Newsletter – Bridges.

I welcomed the fact that David Smith editor of the Y's Retired of the UK Newsletter negotiated an arrangement with the Publication Officer of Bridges to circulate Bridges to all our members.

This has led me to survey from the individual National groups 'reports' their nature and how varied they are in practice! I have little information as to how they have been formed and whether they originally came into being through a 'model' Constitution or started 'had hoc' by keen colleagues! (I am sure there must be in the archives of the WFYR such information!).

What is apparent is how varied 'programmes' are encompassed by the impressive list of member countries of the WFYR and here I quote, Bangladesh, Brazil, Canada, Chile, France, Germany, Hong Kong, India, Japan, Korea, Nigeria, Peru, Philippines, Sri Lanka, Sweden, Taiwan, UK., Uruguay, and USA, (as listed and governed by some 14 officers in governance roles).

From the recorded 'reports' in Bridges what follows is a brief overall picture of the nature of 'national groups' whose common calling originated in the Biblical quotation from John c.17 v. 21, "That they all may be one". Additional information is through association.

Some retired groups are highly organised with Constitutions dictating governance procedures with elected officers, rules of procedure and laws not least audited financial accounts. These 'groups' are inclined to follow the practice experienced in the YMCA and follow a formal pattern whilst others follow a 'loose' Constitution purely as guidelines with the emphasis on socialising.

Programmes and activity common throughout include residential meetings varying between one to five days, one day reunions with lunch - a valuable time of socialising where the main topic is "Do you remember?"!

Most groups enjoyed relationships with Local, Regional or National Councils of YMCAs either through visits, invited speakers or electronic means. Reference was made to joint YMCA/YWCA meetings. A few groups question through discussion/debate and presence political issues at local and national level. Stressed was individual involvement in their respective communities not least social needs. Religious emphasis mainly Christian formed a natural part of the whole meetings of some retired groups. Otherwise the reality of a broad view was that the YMCA was open to people of all Faiths and of none.


I laughingly remember saying that my dad was so anxious to give me away, that he yanked me up the church steps and I missed my footing and sprawled.

Employment laws need to reflect modern workplace

Last month the Government responded to the Taylor review of modern working practices, announcing a consultation on several new reforms that will address the challenges of the changing world of work in the modern economy.

Responding to the Government's new plans, Denise Hatton, Chief Executive for YMCA England & Wales, said: Young people are one of the main groups keeping the gig economy running, but ultimately they are in the most insecure and low paid jobs offering little to no employment rights and security.

It's crucial that today's employment laws reflect the realities of the modern workplace to stop young people being exploited.

It's positive to see the Government taking on board Matthew Taylor's recommendations, but it remains to be seen how these plans will be implemented in practice and if they will truly reflect what's best for young workers.



Reg Bailey CBE has been newly appointed as Chair to the Board of Trustees of the National Council of YMCAs. He was the Chief Executive of Mothers' Union from 1999 until his retirement in 2015

YMCA is the oldest and largest youth charity in the world, founded in London in 1844. Across England and Wales, it runs as a federation working in 740 communities to support young people to belong, contribute and thrive in their communities.

Reg said: "It is an honour to be elected as Chair of the National Council of YMCAs. YMCA has a unique history, one that we are rightly proud of. I believe it is our responsibility as a society to ensure children grow into emotionally resilient young people and YMCA is taking an active role in communities across the country to do this.

"I look forward to helping to provide the leadership and governance we will need to strengthen our National Council and, through our members, impact on and support young people and communities who access our services on a daily basis."

While YMCAs work and respond locally, YMCA England & Wales acts as the national council, supporting each local charity within the federation and acting as a national voice with Government and decision makers.

Reg was appointed CBE in 2013 for services to children and families. He is an Honorary Canon of St Alban's Cathedral, member of the ASA (Advertising Standards Authority) Council; the BBFC (British Board of Film Classification) Advisory Panel on Children's Viewing, and is Chair of SANDS, the still birth and neo-natal death charity.

YMCA launches parent mental health guide for Children's Mental Health Week

New figures, published last month by the YMCA, show that despite the important role parents play in supporting the mental health of their children, many are not up to the task.

YMCA spoke to more than 2,000 11-24 year olds about stigma and mental health, with fewer than half of young people (46%) who had seen or heard harmful language and negative stereotypes about mental health, saying they think that their parents are not comfortable talking to them about the issue. A third of those young people also said they don't believe their parents know where to direct them for support with mental health difficulties, leaving them to scramble for information elsewhere.

To help parents tackle conversations about mental health, YMCA has launched a free parent and carer mental health guide, as part of this year's Children Mental Health Week which was designed by young people. The guide was developed after they spoke to parents who told them that they often felt isolated, embarrassed and ashamed by the challenges they face when talking to their children about mental and emotional difficulties.
