GREETINGS FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear friends and colleagues greetings

We are at any one time moving through a period of world history! This affects the future as we understand our experience in making history now and not least in relation to the development of the YMCA including the Y's Retired of the UK. There is little historically to compare with the present and what is happening in the world today perhaps a bold statement as I attempt to clarify my thoughts as follows.

The movement of populations throughout the world, telephone communication (IT = Information Technology) affecting world economies, in the development of industry and commerce adapting continually convinces us that the only true reality is change! One illustration is our own Newsletter progressing from black and white print and photographs to colour with improved reporting on the fact that the Y's Retired of the UK Committee governs through email, telephone communication and only when necessary post, such as when one of our computers 'go down'!

The inaugural meeting of the renewing of the Y's Retired of the UK met on 8th September 2008 in the Barbican YMCA, London was the first and last meeting 'face to face', the committee met to agree how we might govern/administer the Y's Retired of the UK. We agreed the above format by using modern technology – it has succeeded very well!! * see.

This changing world however relates also to the often misused word 'Ecumenical – (of the whole gathered earth)' and by no means least how they further relate to the word fundamentalism within Christianity, Hinduism, Islam, Sikhism, Buddhism and other Faiths. We often take out of context the original thoughts by our forefathers whatever their religious background their respective historical written word of the law as it applied to their particular understanding of their faith.

Likewise Sir George Williams and the group of young men who sat down together in Paris to formulate a Policy and expected direction for the YMCA would be amazed at the YMCA today! It might well be true that the YMCA has continued since 1844 due to 'it's' ability to change in service to succeeding generations through 172 years!

In light of the above we, the YMCA, proudly uphold the statement, "We welcome into our membership people of all Faiths and of none". Where does this statement then lead us in an Inter-faith society?

I suspect the majority of us would harp back by way of recall, whether professional staff or laypersons, to the strong Christian base on which the YMCA was founded and our own personal faith in God together with the influence of the church. It has been my own experience in visiting Local YMCAs of the five Continents during my career an overwhelming evidence of the Christian Faith in leadership terms but occasionally none whatsoever.

In South America I encountered a bust of George Williams in a local YMCA and a large picture of George Williams similar to the one hanging in the entrance to the London YMCA in past years but no reference to the YMCA as a Christian Movement. That was some 20 years ago! Today I have to ask myself is the YMCA different, is inevitable change for the better, does it reflect the values based on the Christian Faith or is it more like a Philosophical Society. Colleagues have shared with me they consider the YMCA in general terms has lost the very emphasis of the Christian Faith! What do you think?

I close with a challenging thought. Have we reached within the YMCA a time when we have to consider major changes in the way we look at the bold statement I referred to in paragraph four above – "We welcome into our membership people of all Faiths and of none", do we also, "Welcome into our <u>leadership</u> people of all Faiths and of none" if so how do we now consider the Christian base on which the YMCA was founded? Certainly there is fine equally qualified leadership in all Faiths and of none. Religious loosely means God fearing.

YMCA England's lan Green appointed chief executive of Terrence Higgins Trust

Green replaces Rosemary Gillespie, who was asked to stand down from the post last summer after only 15 months in charge



The HIV and sexual health charity the Terrence Higgins Trust has appointed Ian Green, former head of YMCA England, as its new chief executive.

Green, who has worked for the YMCA for more than 20 years, will replace Rosemary Gillespie, who was asked to stand down from the trust last summer after 15 months in charge.

The charity said at the time that a "change of leadership was needed for the next stage of the organisation's development". Gillespie said she had been poorly treated and the trust did not "have the stomach for the programme of change I was brought in to deliver".

Green, who will join the charity in March, is currently part of the executive staff team of the World Alliance of YMCAs, based in Geneva. He was chief executive of YMCA England between 2008 and 2013 and before that spent six years as head of YMCA London South West. He spent 20 years until May 2010 as a Conservative councillor for Ealing Council in west London, including time as cabinet member for adult social services and housing, leader of the opposition and mayor.

He is chair of Advance, a housing association that works with people with learning disabilities and mental health issues, and is on the board of the West Hampshire Clinical Commissioning Group.

A spokeswoman for the charity declined to confirm what Green's salary would be. Robert Glick, chair of the Terrence Higgins Trust, said: "Ian has a track record of strong leadership, and we are confident he will ensure that THT continues as the UK's leading HIV and sexual health charity."

Green said he had long admired the charity's work and was honoured to accept the role. "I look forward to working collaboratively with staff and volunteers, the board of trustees and all external partners to continue to deliver innovative HIV and sexual health services across England, Scotland and Wales, in what are undoubtedly challenging times, with cuts to health and social care budgets," he said.

YMCA Appeal for Refugees

The YMCA worldwide family stands together in support of refugees.

"Rarely in modern history have so many been so desperate to flee. Now their brave, and tragic, journeys are reshaping Europe and the world", reported 'TIME' magazine on October 19, 2015.

The shocking image of a 3 year old boy from Syria, dead on a beach, became the iconic photo of the 2015 European refugee crisis. But we, the worldwide YMCA family, cannot forget countless others; Kenya's large Kakuma Camp in Turkana County for refugees and asylum seekers from Somalia, South Sudan and Ethiopia; and over-crowded longstanding camps for refugees from Palestine and Syria in Lebanon and Jordan.

The YMCA has responded to this extraordinary challenge and crisis with The Global YMCA Refugee Initiative. A high-level Steering Committee for the Initiative agreed during a meeting on November 4 to open a YMCA Fundraising Appeal.

Taking into consideration:

the unprecedented worldwide scale and contexts of the refugee crisis,

our Christian mission and dedication to fight against injustice towards young people all over the world regardless their religion, gender, race or culture,

our historical successful longstanding work with refugees, and today's extremely relevant YMCA work with refugees, immigrants and internally

displaced people in many countries

we ask for your solidarity and support.

Resources collected from this appeal will support current YMCA refugee work, as well as new projects of local and national movements worldwide who are ready to respond with various programmes to help refugees. Examples of countries and programmes include:

- Armenia (summer camps and day-care for children of Syrian refugees),

- France (Centre for Asylum Seekers and vocational trainings),

- Germany (housing for refugees and integration programmes),

- Lebanon (integration programmes and medical aid),

- Pakistan (school for Afghan refugees),
- Spain (return programmes and counselling),

- Ukraine (emergency relief and educational programmes for internally

displaced children),

- Canada and USA (integration programmes for immigrants and advocacy).

The support will focus on young people, helping them to survive their first days, months, transitions and adaptations to their new lives. The support will have emergency as well as long-term impact.
