The 2022 World Council adopted achieving a Sustainable World as one of the movements 'Four Key Pillars of Impact' agreeing that:

The YMCA believes that we should all commit and take action for the protection and regeneration of our Planet, preparing for a Just Transition to a world where humans live in full harmony with nature.

The YMCA commits to become a Greener Movement, an active youth voice on climate justice and champion of youth-led sustainability solutions.

These are powerful statements and, with the power and energy of youth behind them, we should find encouragement in knowing that young people in the YMCA can be part of making a difference in the world which so desperately needs it!

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Y's Retired World Council Conference 2022 Report received from John Naylor (seen here with WFYR colleague)



This year the Y's Retired (WFYR) was more closely integrated with the main World Council with three intertwined strands – WFYR, World Council and our Danish hosts.

WFYR Conference

As always there was a great fellowship - friendships renewed, and new ones made. Among the highlights were:

Election of a new WFYR President

Kohei Yamada from Japan was elected as the new President, the first non-USA President. This is a milestone for Y's Retired and an expression of the global maturity of WFYR. However, it is recognised that our USA colleagues do still form an important bedrock for Y's Retired throughout the world. Unfortunately, Phil Dwyer, the outgoing President who did an outstanding job, had covid so there was not an opportunity to thank him formally.

Global Retirement Initiative

Pensions for retired colleagues who have no state or YMCA retirement income. The Latin America and Caribbean Area scheme piloted by WFYR with support from USA Brotherhood Fund has proved viable and plans are under way to extend it to Kenya and Sri Lanka as pilots for Asia and Africa. The poverty of retired colleagues has been a longstanding concern and it is very encouraging to see the progress being made.

Secours Speciaux

The report covered the response to covid where almost 100 retirees received at least \$1000 to help them and their families through the crisis and the \$100,000 given to support staff jobs threatened by covid as part of WAY initiative to prevent vulnerable national movements closing. There were heartfelt thanks from recipients some of whom were at the conference.

The new website, simplified application processes and form were outlined as were plans for the future expansion of the fund.

Area and Movement Reports were made to WFYR by World and Area leaders starting Carlos Sanvee, our very impressive Secretary General as were Y's Retired area Vice Presidents. An underlying theme for the next four years is the expansion of national Y's Retired organisations.

One of the most moving report was from Viktor, the Ukraine YMCA National Secretary, who spoke of the courageous work by colleagues in the 18 local YMCA's who were providing support in their local communities including food, clothes, shelter counselling and family support.

There was a separate WFYR session led by Aarhus University on religious persecution and the challenges faced by countries and YMCAs worldwide. The final session brainstormed ideas for the future development of WFYR.

World Council

Record attendance 2300 (50% in person and 50% online); memorable presentations; excellent chemistry within the leadership, particularly between the President and Secretary General; and fantastic Danish hosts, all resulted in an outstanding experience for a conference hardened person like me!

For the first time WFYR formally endorsed Vision 2030 the World Alliance (WAY) strategic plan – an endorsement noted by the whole World Council. This reflected the way that World Alliance had consulted widely and researched thoroughly. All WFYR delegates participated in main World Council sessions and the co-labs (small cross generational working groups) to engage with the four main pillars of the strategic plan and its local relevance. Much to my surprise it was one of the Council highlights.

Danish Hosts

Aarhus, known as the city of smiles, lived up to its reputation. The ever-smiling team of Danish YMCA young volunteers gave a fantastic boost to the event. They were so warm and positive. For the first time we were entertained for dinner in family homes. The visits to YMCA and related work were stimulating. The icing on the cake was a visit with the Scottish delegation to Legoland!

Regrets? I was the only WFYR delegate from the UK. You missed a great experience. Hopefully there will be more UK retirees in Toronto, the 2026 World Council venue.

"Our global movement is a beautiful giant that is hiding in plain view, and it is time to change that! In parallel with pursuing the goals of Vision 2030, we have the task of elevating our brand and making our name synonymous with Youth Empowerment."

No other youth empowerment organization can claim to operate in 120 countries, she said, or claim to serve more than 60 million people. "Let us put our collective thinking hats on and come up with inspired new revenue streams to fund our Vision 2030 plans and dream up alternative revenue schemes to build our reserves."

Increasing the number of young people in leadership positions at local and national YMCAs and ensuring more women are in leadership positions at local and national levels are priorities for us all, she said.

In the absence of this special Programme, we would have booked our tickets to travel from the Nairobi Airport in Kenya to the Hotel in Aarhus and from there again to the AirPort back home!!

'Wellcome' to the Archives!

Colleagues will remember that the YMCA Archives (all 978 boxes of them!) are in the care of the Cadbury Research Library Special Collections at the University of Birmingham and being indexed and conserved as part of a project funded by the Wellcome Trust, along with the archives of the Youth Hostel Association under the title '*Healthy Bodies, Healthy Minds*'.

The project is funded to run until June 2023 and employs two full time archivists, a student placement intern and volunteer. A recent update meeting heard of the progress being made on indexing and cataloguing national, regional and local papers prior to 2000.

The purpose is to produce a coherent accessible index of all the documents available which will make it more practicable for researchers around the world to access the information that they seek.

Although held back by COVID, the project is almost halfway through and work is about to begin on Community and Youth activities, BAOR work and associated organisations such as the Women's Auxiliary, BSA/AOS/APS as well as personal papers lodged with the archive.

A challenge that the project is beginning to face is the indexing of unannotated photographs taken of places and people not easily recognised. Y's Retired memories may prove helpful in solving these problems!!

It is hoped that a Zoom Meeting of Y's retired in the autumn will include a visit from Matthew Goodwin who is responsible for the YMCA part of the project.

No longer was he in authority, no longer was he serving the needs of others! We all had our experiences on signing off to live on adequate YMCA pensions!

However, my reminiscing was awakened by the amazing experience I and others had enjoyed during the years of service. For we had worked for an organisation unlike many others given us whether by training, education or work experience a huge intake of knowledge and information and here I bore you with a few.

We had experienced a learning curve from the first to the last day. I quote. A knowledge of accountancy, building maintenance, sale of and purchase of property, employment of staff, social services, human relationships, counselling, legacies and wills, electronics in all its guises not least I am afraid ZOOM, Court appearances on behalf of wayward members, health and safety, safeguarding, writing skills, Christian principles as related to other Faiths etc. etc. you could add 'ad nauseum'! What other employing body can compete with that?!

What happens then in retirement according to your experience. I have found a lot of 'loneliness' for single colleagues together with 'teleitus', illness and ageing problems, bereavement of spouses, family members and friends!

With all our work experiences as 'paragraph four' those skills developed give opportunity of sharing voluntary service to numerous Charities in the Local Community, not least the Church always crying out for treasurers or people with the necessary skills like pastoral care among our ageing friends for whom a regular telephone call makes all the difference!

ARTHUR BENNETT
28th May 1923 - 13 June 2022

I first had the great pleasure of meeting my long-time friend and colleague when I started fulltime work at Ipswich YMCA in September 1964 at the age of 16. Arthur was my first Line Manager and with great wit and laughter, very soon made me feel at home.

I lived in the YMCA Hostel in Park Road, Arthur was Hostel Secretary and I was Assistant Youth Secretary (Trainee) with John Cockett. Our CEO at the time was Ray Onions.

Over the next few years Arthur taught and showed me his many talents which I took on board. He taught me that the job was a vocation, and that a vocation was like a gift from God, 9am to 5pm was immaterial.

So, regular work started at 7.30am and finished at 11pm six days a week, with some time off in the afternoons. Arthur was always rushing around fulfilling jobs and tasks that needed to be done and always with a big smile on his face and time for all his staff whatever their designation.

He was full of integrity and was grounded in a strong value base given by his parents which, in turn, rubbed off on all those close to him. He was a joy to be with and nothing was too much for him. He recognised that his important YMCA work for which he had trained, consisted of guiding, nurturing, assisting Ipswich young people alongside many varied overseas British Council students, all male, who lived in the hostel, often coming from warring countries.

All were made at home in Arthur's hostel; even regular entertainment was organised for them, but not on Friday's because Friday was always the day Arthur left Park Road early to travelled to Lowestoft to be with his beloved Rosemary.

Arthur was known as "Arthur Rank" because of his love of cinema; so much that every Wednesday through the Autumn, Winter and Spring seasons there would be a variety of classic films released, all 16mm films, shown in the Ipswich YMCA Main Hall. When one reel finished the 6 second dots on projector 1 reel showed and seamlessly the second 16mm started on projector 2 showing the next reel. The Ipswich Gaumont had nothing on "Arthur Rank."

And when CinemaScope arrived it took the whole of Wednesday afternoon to unfold and erect the massive screen, such was the attention to detail given by this wonderful servant to musicals and classic films.

And when he was caught 'short' he often used a turn of phrase that I have borrowed all my life from him, "I'm just off to visit the Pope."

From those early impressionable days at Ipswich, I left for Lincoln YMCA and Arthur left with family to Stockton YMCA. From Lincoln I travelled 4 years later to become CEO of Barnard Castle YMCA, County Durham and Arthur was appointed CEO of Nottingham YMCA, where he and his family stayed until his retirement around 1997.

By this stage I had travelled out to Hong Kong YMCA and 7 years later returned to rebuild Waltham Forest YMCA, become Regional Secretary, then Area Secretary of some 53 YMCAs in the Central Region of England, one of which was Nottingham YMCA.

So happily, I was linked up again with my dear friend Arthur and his dutiful and supportive wife Rosemary. Matthew and Suzanne were starting their high-powered professional careers having both excelled in truly grounded knowledge given to them by Arthur and Rosemary. They were so very proud of each of their children and their partners which each went onto love and marry, resulting in grandchildren that Arthur and Rosemary so loved and were besotted with, regularly sharing with my Sue and I, who was doing what, which, how and when.

This humble, honest Christian gentle-man never stopped his service to others. He had so many strong political views of the day, and if they affect the everyday man or woman, he would make a clear thoughtful reference to them and their plight.

Arthur loved people and folk loved him back – just as Rosemary left a big hole in many hearts, so Arthur will surely do the same. Not quite the 100 years man, but Arthur with his great humility, surpasses so many other milestones, his remarkable journey through life resulting in a life so well lived.

So Arthur taught me that:-

"Humility is the ability to be without pride or arrogance and it is a principal character that should be seen in those who follow Jesus Christ. Jesus is the best example of someone who humbly followed God's plan for His life."

Dear David & Sue

Thank you so much for kindly informing us of the sad passing of our mutual friend. A few reminiscences.....

I first met Arthur in July 1960, having just completed my National Service in the Royal Army Pay Corps, otherwise known as the Civilian Light Infantry. I was planning a holiday, but the YMCA intervened. Having been accepted for a place on the Residential Training Course for YMCA Secretaries, I left the Army on the Thursday, and went to Ipswich as a Supernumerary, on the Monday.

At that time Ipswich YMCA was in two parts, one a traditional local association, the other an Armed Services Center for USAF services personal based nearby at Bentwaters and Lakenheath.

Arthur's first words to me were, with characteristically impeccable politeness "May I call you Paul, or do you prefer Mr. Harper?" On the first Monday in October we set-off for London and the Training Course, (having lunch at my parent's home in Chelmsford en-route).

One of Arthur's great interest was films and he ran a very successful Film Club at Ipswich YMCA, complete with music by Robert Farnon, dimmed lighting and ice creams available during the interval!!

Whilst on the "Course" Arthur would visit what were then known as "Classic" cinemas, and inevitably emerge with free tickets. He was a wonderful support during the course, and although 16 years older than most of us, still fully participated in all the Physical Education, under the leadership of Commander Chick Thomson.

Following the course Arthur went to Ipswich, and I was with him when England won the World Football Cup, Arthur's interest in football could be summed up in what he said to me "Why don't they give them a ball each, instead of them all chasing after just one"

After a period at Stockton-on Tees YMCA, Arthur became General Secretary at Nottingham YMCA, having been there as Asst. to Ray Collins some years earlier. I used to visit and always received a most hospitable welcome from Rosemary and Arthur. It was a privilege to say a few words at his retirement, alongside Dr Clyde Binfield. Following retirement Arthur helped at Derby YMCA.

He was Churchwarden at All Saints Nottingham for many years, and cared deeply for the Church of England, indeed most of our recent telephone conversations related to Arthur's concerns regarding C of E!

He was involved ecumenically in Nottingham and also served with Christian Aid. Along with Rosemary he attended the Reunions of our Training Course, the last one was held in Nottingham in 2001.

I am one of so many who have enjoyed Arthur's friendship' such privilege, his kindness, humour will never be forgotten. As someone once said "Arthur didn't talk about Christianity....he lived it!

He had been having a great time with his friend Graham Child, enjoying the sailing and weather. Early on 12 July, he set out for a swim and never came back. The coast guard was alerted, and his body was found later on that day.

It is a profound shock and loss for us as his family. And if you knew him, we expect you feel the same too. He touched a lot of lives and his life will have impacted so many others.

We don't yet know what the next steps will be. We can be sure of a few things, though. There will be a funeral and a proper send-off, befitting a man who loved a party and chatting to new people.

“he was so much more than 'a Boss”

When Nick joined YMCA England as National Secretary, we did not know what to expect, this being the first time this post had been occupied by someone who had not previously served as a YMCA Staff Member.

It was not long before we got to know an endearing and challenging colleague, committed to making the world a better and more just place, encouraging everyone to use their gifts and skills within the YMCA. He was always interested in new ideas and fitted well into the atmosphere of the Blair years of government.

His methods were not always orthodox! Staff meetings were held at the Farm in Sherriff Hutton, work appraisals held over coffee in the members room of the Law Society- he liked to do things differently! A man of ideas and plans, through personal experience he was committed to the development of Parenting work in YMCA England, raising the funds for it himself. Sometimes as a staff team we would try to pull him back just a little so that we could have time to respond to his next idea!

Always generous with his time and encouragement, he was so much more than 'a Boss' he was very much a friend over the years.

It was with mixed feelings of loss and pride that we saw him move on to Geneva to be Secretary General of the World Alliance of YMCAs, a post he held in his inimitable style along with Sue's support. Julia and I were welcomed to their flat in Geneva and enjoyed being shown around and enjoying forays into France and long lunches in Annecy!!

It was through a typical Nick error that Julia and I and our church became involved in the YMCA in Albania! I received a misdirected email intended for someone else about YMCA Skhodra. However, it was timely as our church in St Albans was seeking a mission partner. Nick came and spoke to a meeting at the church about the YMCA work with Roma families and so began a fruitful relationship between our church and YMCA Skhodra and participation in the Albanian Field group.

An 'always to be remembered' moment was waiting for Nick to join our group at Tirana airport for the flight home. With little time to spare he emerged battered and bloodied from a taxi after getting lost in the shrubs and hills around Tirana and wandering into a restricted military zone. He managed to persuade the military to take him to the taxi waiting for him at the bottom of the hill to catch the flight.

Having been patched up by the airport manager, Nick joined the flight telling us not to tell Sue of his escapade!

Nick's commitment to his faith is evident in his support of Sue as she entered the priesthood and through his love of his family, his parish work and involvement in Christian Aid.

It was a delight to spend the day with Nick and Sue at Fountains Abbey a couple of years ago.

We thank God for all that he achieved, for all that he gave to us and in our hearts and memories continues to do so.

The passing of

NICK NIGHTINGALE Secretary General of the World YMCA from 1998 to 2002



As secretary-general, he acted on his vision set out in his 1998 acceptance speech:

"I think the YMCA is about helping people pull themselves together. At the heart of our task is bringing transformation to individuals, their relationship with God, their sense of self-worth, the opportunity to be fully realized. The YMCA has changed me and I'm sure it has changed many of you. Our work with individuals, I suggest, is the foundation on which everything else is built. Our calling is to work first with individuals and then through them with their communities.

I developed a vision of a world bridge called the YMCA. It's a bridge that spans all of our activities and aspirations, and our many different versions and images of what the YMCA is and does. A bridge that allows us to recognize that difference, that each YMCA is unique."

He was a unifying Secretary General as he completed a mission and organizational review and led the adoption of a Governance Policy Agreement and an overall operational plan for strengthening the Movement. He also worked closely with then President Martin Vogler to ensure unity around a range of difficult political issues.

A commercial lawyer by training, before being World Secretary General of the YMCA, he was National Secretary General of YMCA England.

Since stepping down in 2002, he has continued to serve causes he passionately believed in. He has served on the boards of several non-profit organizations, promoted Fairtrade products and volunteered for Oxfam.

He supported the ministry of his wife, an Anglican priest, and belatedly converted to the possibilities presented by doing business online. He enjoyed the day in London in June 2019, when he joined current Secretary General Carlos Sanvee and former General Secretary Johan Vilhelm Eltvik and Bart Shaha to mark the YMCA's 175th anniversary in a special service at St Martin's in the Field, followed by a reception at the Houses of Parliament of the United Kingdom.

Carlos Sanvee writes:

"Nick hired me in 1998, while I was still a young YMCA officer from my hometown of Togo. He saw in me something I didn't even know I had. He believed me. He invited me to work at the YMCA world headquarters in Geneva and gave me the Finance portfolio. He told me that I didn't need an academic background for the role – he simply said that I had done well in Togo, and I could do it at a headquarters, where people would help me when I needed it.

All the while, he insisted that I was equipped to be a leader, and when I was named secretary-general, he smiled and said, "I'm not surprised." He was my mentor and confidant, and he and his family became my friends. I remember going to see him in 2007 in York, when I was considering applying for the post of Secretary General of the African Alliance of YMCAs, and he advised me to accept the post.

He dies the week after the 20th World YMCA Council, when the global YMCA Movement set a clear course for the future. It reminds me that as we move forward to serve the youth, we are standing on the shoulders of many great people, like Nick, who are gone. We are eternally grateful for everything he has brought us.

My sincere condolences to his beloved wife Sue and their children Becky, Liz and Tom. The Sanvee family was proud to feel part of the Nightingale family, and the YMCA family mourns one of their best."

The Brazilian YMCA movement also shows solidarity with the posthumous tributes to the dear friend of Brazil, Nick Nightingale.
