Hi Stephen, Hanna and David.


British Boys for British Farms.

Martin Houghton-Brown is Chair of the National Council of YMCAs.

Martin was elected in November 2016 after serving five years as a Trustee. Earlier this year, he was also elected on to the Executive of YMCA Europe, which serves to strengthen YMCA National Councils across the continent. His early career began in teaching and then church-based youth work, supporting young people affected by substance use, mental and sexual health issues as well as homelessness. He was ordained in 1996 and went on to lead daily devotions at YMCA Cheltenham.

He performs his current role as Chair alongside his position as Chief Executive of youth homelessness charity, Depaul UK. He began this role following a similar Chief Executive position at Missing People, a charity that provides support for missing and runaway children and vulnerable adults, and a Deputy Director role at The Children's Society.

Through his youth sector roles, Martin has engaged regularly with Government on policy matters while also contributing towards statutory guidance on children who go missing. He was a founder member of the Prime Ministerial taskforce on missing persons and served as a member of the Office for the Children's Commissioners' Inquiry into Child Sexual Exploitation in Gangs and Groups.



Ayub is Vice-Chair of YMCA England.

He also serves on the Board of YMCA Thames Gateway where he the Further Education Trust for Leadership, a Think Tank for the FE and Skills sector. Prior to this, he was the CEO of a Multi Academy Trust.

Over a 20 year period, Ayub has gained extensive experience of strategic leadership and operational management, large-scale commissioning and contract management of education, training, advice, and support services. He has worked for North West London TEC where he led and managed adult and youth based programmes. He was involved in raising standards by working with the then Training Standards Council piloting the first public inspection regime in the TEC movement. He also worked for the Learning and Skills Council where as part of a successful Executive Team in Essex he led the Post 16 Learning Directorate. In 2003 as the Interim Chief Executive of Connexions South London he led the Partnership through a period of change resulting in significant improvements including the first successful OFSTED Inspection of a sub contracted Connexions Partnership in London. In 2008, he set up the Royal Borough of Kingston upon Thames Sub-Regional Unit.

Ayub was a member of the Governments Careers Profession Task Force helping to shape its recommendations as detailed in the 2010 published report "Towards a Strong Careers Profession". Ayub is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts and a Member of the

Chartered Management Institute.

It is with great sadness that I inform you of the sudden death of Peter Robertson. Peter was out playing walking football this morning, which he loved, when he suffered a fatal heart attack.

Helen Turner shared the news with me and I know that you will all hold Peter's wife Alison, sons Simon and Jonathan and wider family in your thoughts and prayers at this time.

At our recent YMCA Scotland Awards Dinner, Peter was awarded the Sir George Williams Medal. This is the highest award available within the YMCA in Scotland and is for distinguished and outstanding service to the YMCA in Scotland. Below is an extract from his nomination, which gives you an insight into the significant contribution that Peter made over many years.

'Peter started his Scottish YMCA involvement when he became General Secretary of Dumfries YMCA in the 1970s having trained at the YMCA College in London and worked at Ambleside YMCA and Henley YMCA and having been a member of Carlisle YMCA as a teenager.

After some years Peter moved to work for a local funder, The Holywood Trust, and he became a YMCA volunteer. He was so committed to the YMCA Movement that there was no suggestion of not continuing to be involved. He eventually became Chairman of Dumfries YMCA and was also supported the development of YMCAs in Stranraer and Gatehouse of Fleet, regularly travelling across the region to attend meetings and negotiate with officials on behalf of the YMCA.

Peter also became involved in things nationally, on the National Executive and various committees. He chaired the Personnel Committee in the late 1980s and early 1990s. He was Vice Chair of YMCA Scotland from 1992 to 2004 and Chairman from 2004 to 2008.

There is a saying 'if you cut them in half they would read...' For Peter that would definitely be- YMCA. '

Peter Robertson

EULOGY OF PETER ROBERTSON

Peter started as a young full member volunteer in Carlisle YMCA and died having been a YMCA volunteer serving YMCA Scotland. In between he participated in Young Members' Assemblies (led by Reg' Wake). Trained at YMCA National College in its transition year 69/70 from Stockwell to Waltham Forest. Youth Worker at Ambleside YMCA, then Henley YMCA where he met and married Ali' his wife of 38 years, moving to Dumfries (as YMCA General Secretary), where they raised their two sons Simon and Jonathan, where they their wife and partner and grandchildren live.

Peter left employment with the YMCA to follow a vision of a wider opportunity to serve the YMCA and young people with the Holywood Trust. Kerry Reilly {YMCA Scotland CEO} says "Peter had an enormous impact on the YMCA in Scotland and locally in the South West (Dumfries & Galloway). As Director of the Holywood Trust he had a strategic responsibility for funding and networking across D&G and really used that to the advantage of the YMCA. I think it fair to say that YMCA work and the local associations of Stranraer and Gatehouse of Fleet would not have been established, had it not been for the vision and determination of Peter".

In his spare time - Peter later became Chairman of Dumfries YMCA, where Kerry (then a young student) recalled, "I remember heading to Butlins in Ayr with him to run a Princes Trust 'Work Sport and Leisure' programme and how great it was learning from him as we delivered training to unemployed young people from across Dumfries and Galloway". Peter served as Vice Chair of YMCA Scotland from 1992 until 2004 - 12 years! Becoming Chair of YMCA Scotland from 2004 - 2008. Peter spent many many hours in his car driving up and down to YMCA Scotland meetings and his location in Dumfries was never a hindrance to him attending. As well as YMCA Scotland Executive meetings he chaired the Personnel Committee and the Wiston Lodge Management Committee for many years".

All of the YMCA Scotland staff attended the service of celebration of Peter's life. Kerry wrote "We are so pleased that YMCA Scotland was able to honour Peter's contribution to the YMCA by awarding him the Sir George William's Medal just one month ago at our ABM". The Sir George William's Medal is the highest award in the YMCA Movement in Scotland and is for distinguished and outstanding service to the YMCA in Scotland. Peter is one of only 14 people to have been awarded the Medal.

The theme of the Celebration of Peter's life service, held at Crichton Church was wood to celebrate Peter's love of wood following in his father's (a ship's carpenter) footsteps. The family service that preceded at the beautiful crematorium had a theme of water in recognition of Peter's later fascination and enjoyment with sailing ships. Rev' Barrie Thomas – Peter's brother in law shared some amusing exploits of harbours never reached and "man over board" incidents. At the conclusion of the "public service," the more than 200 who attended were invited to take an acorn, plant it and email Ali' a photograph of where it was planted and growing. Mighty Oaks spring to mind!

A young English colleague said" Peter was 'another of the great YMCA staff gone' . . . YMCA through and through . . . a YMCA Youth worker at heart; one of the 'old school' YMCA college youth workers who was interested in the development of young people, growing and nurturing their aspirations and giving them opportunity to reach their fullest potential". Those of us who knew him well will miss him, those who benefitted from his vision, persistence, perseverance, concern, support, care, and love have lots to be grateful for. But what a fine legacy.
