# President's ponderings

There has been a lot of coverage lately about the arrival of refugees and migrants to the UK. This has included the controversy around the accommodation barge 'Bibby Stockholm' and the 'Stop the Boats' policy.

Our church has developed a close relationship with the Asylum Seekers and migrants who are living in a hotel about a mile away from the church. Some have come across the channel in small boats others have come with visas to seek asylum.

Some have been living in the hotel for over a year just waiting for an interview to progress their applications. Although capable and skilled, they are unable to work and live in limbo type existence. Here are young men, far from home, in a strange place, with very few possessions seeking escape from war, persecution or poverty but all facing uncertain futures.

With support from the wider community and other organisations, we offer a weekly café providing friendship, games and conversation along with specific personal support and the distribution of clothes and other necessities when they become available and occasional trips to places around and about.

As I have got to know these men I am struck by how similar the aspirations and needs of these men are so similar to those who George Williams reached out to in London in 1844. The YMCA's has played a role over the years helping many to make fresh starts like. post war refugees, the Vietnamese Boat people

Time passes by, but the needs of our fellow human beings do not change and we need movements such as the YMCA as much as ever.

# First Worldwide Zoom Meeting

for YMCA Retirees May 24, 2023

Over100 participants including a gathering of 32 in Germany in 86 locations joined in the first ever Y's Retired world wide Zoom meeting.

The technology was successfully handled by YMCA Canada, Whilst this was in the evening for Europe, for others it was rather more challenging, it being 3am for the participants from Japan! Speakers at the event included Kohei Yamada President of WFYR; Carlos Sanvee, World Alliance Secretary General and Juan Simoes YMCA Europe.

The main speaker was Victor Sekbulov of YMCA Ukraine who gave an inspiring insight into the work and challenges faced by the YMCA since the Russian Invasion, which follows below.

European Secretary Juan Simoes was able to report that YMCA Europe is developing skill development programmes in 4 countries and with HP has been able to provide 5323 Laptops to Moldova.

All in all it was an impressive and inspiring event. The next World link up is planned for 24<sup>th</sup> October. It will be worth joining in! Watch out for joining details!

The work of Ukraine YMCA has been supported by Pan European Fuinds and has included the involvement of 32 different national movements.

World Secretary Carlos Sanvee reminded us that we should keep hope alive; that love is stronger than hate and transcends everything, Without love there is no peace and that the YMCA should stand together in love.



Victor Sekbulov of YMCA Ukraine explained to the WFYR Zoom Meeting that.

Twenty of the twenty four YMCAs in Ukraine are now operating. Five youth centres have accommodated over 35,000 people. 100,000 water filters and 50 tons of aid have been distributed to 100 destinations.. Y members have been involved Uniform sewing, helping in evacuations to safe places and have been trained in First Aid and Tactical Emergency techniques.

This has all happened in the context of bombing raids, lack of electricity, loss of some leaders and the need of psychological support for volunteers. A major concern has become the psychological support needed by many traumatised young people which is being offered through YMCA Youth Centres.

Respite care for children has been provided through summer camps in the Carpathian Mountains. Future work is being focussed on providing educational hubs to help individuals develop skills for employment, the support of internally displaced persons, returning military personnel and also support of young people who have lost parents and relatives in the war. Victor stressed that the situation is complicated by problems caused by propaganda and some oppression of Russian speaking people. The YMCA is committed to reconciliation work when this is possible using the experiences gained by the work in the Balkans.

# **Secours Speciaux Half Year Report**

In recent years Secours Speciaux has given two main types of support:

Responding to individual requests, largely, from colleagues who have a lifetime of YMCA service, little or no pension and suffer from life threatening illnesses ranging from cancer to heart disease or where death of a colleague has impacted the family. As I write, there is an emergency request from an Indian colleague for an urgent lifesaving heart operation. Last month a request was received on behalf of the wife of a colleague in Latin America who lost her husband and then her husband's two brothers leaving her with medical and funeral bills and very little future income to support herself and family including an aged mother.

Wider response to the impact on retired colleagues with little or no pension of covid, rampant inflation, and in some countries, like Sri Lanka, political unrest. In 2022, 78 grants of \$300 per person were made.

Last year income from donations and the cost of individual requests broke even.

However, the wider response (£21,000) had to be funded from reserves built up over past years.

So far this year, there is a shortfall between income from contributions and responses to individual requests of over £4,200.

It therefore looks that if there is to be any wider response, reserves will again be needed.

Thanks to a generous £5000 contribution from Reg Wake's estate Y's Retired UK's contribution this year is likely to be £7,781, just over £1000 more than last year, nowhere near enough to fund a wider response.

Note the final click is not on Secours Speciaux but Staff Assistance Fund, which is felt to be a better description of what the fund does. Secours Speciaux is still used but in a more secondary role.

## **Memories of an AOS Conference**

It was Wednesday afternoon at the annual (1975) AOS conference, in Skegness. Contrary to the norm, the rain had held off, and the wicket on Woodside's lawn looked almost decent. The North versus South cricket match was 'on.' Over the years, honours were fairly even, although it should be said that some of the south's better results featured good performances from northern lads who had defected. Ones allegiance on these occasions might be determined by the geographical location of the YMCA at which one served. I believe a line south of the Humber, was arbitrarily assigned, rather than an ancestral tree coursing with the pure northern county blood of say a Yorkshireman or Northumbrian. Bill Sargison and Richard Gooch, both authentic southerners, were spearheading the south's bowling attack on this occasion. Gooch had gone so far as to remove his Etonian scarf, a sure indication that he was taking things seriously! Paul Harper prowled at deep mid-off, Mike Kent too, was out in the deep, whilst Michael Hands, fielding at first slip, quietly figured out some details of the pension plan. Ronnie Howe officiated at one end, or was it both?

Anyway, I was batting, and was facing the last ball of an over. I decided a quick single was called for to get me to the 'Kenning Wing' end, , and a gentle push towards mid-off set me on my way. I got about a yard out of the crease when my Achilles tendon snapped, (I didn't know it at the time) and down I went. Southern faces gathered over and around me, peering down and inquiring as to my state of health. Comments such as "Get up Carnaby", and "Stop fooling around" did not exactly ease the pain! It soon became apparent that I needed to leave the field, and willing, southern hands reached down to lift me. At this moment Paul Harper stuck his head into the circle of heads and with total absence of malice, (I think) quietly said "By the way, Carnaby, you're out." The last image I recall was of the stumps minus a bail. Paul always has been a gentleman.

The AOS conferences I attended over the years were rich in fellowship and brotherly love, and 1975 was no exception, but ever since that fateful incident, I have never witnessed a runout that didn't cause a pain in my right leg. I think it's known as PTROS or Post Traumatic Run Out Syndrome!

## Below is the first excerpt of Val Wallis' YMCA Story – shared with the Cambridge Lunch Group.

Thank you for your welcome and it's good to be here at the Ys retired Cambridge Lunch gathering Looking round the room with so many eminent and eloquent YMCA colleagues I do have to wonder what moment of madness it was that you asked me to talk to you today.

It strikes me that there is a lot of YMCA years in the room just Vic and I make a century I wonder how close we would get to a millennium of YMCA service if we added all our years together. We all have our own YMCA journeys and stories to tell but perhaps mine is slightly different, one being a volunteer, although I know there are others in the room, but also in the late sixties early seventies being a rare species. Being young and female in that era was very rare indeed.

So, I want to take you back to 1967 and you to imagine a tall slim leggy blond wearing a skirt her father had described as little more than a wide belt arriving at Maidstone YMCA to meet the new General Secretary Roy Holgate. He wanted a nucleus of young Christians to do voluntary work. As a quiet shy

person with not a lot of confidence, being described by her mother as an educational disappointment, with a pronounced stutter, atrocious spelling and numeracy not a strong point this was a big step.

Whether Roy saw any potential in this dumb blond or just needed volunteers I'll never know but a couple of months later I started on the reception desk. I can't remember who chose Friday night but it was to become a momentous decision as a certain young man used to come in on a Friday night to prepare the football pitch on a Friday. The rest as they say is history.

Maidstone was a very vibrant center with nearly 4000 members almost half under 25 and a very equal gender split. So. imagine my surprise when venturing into the region I met the old, male, grey suited brigade.

Although to be fair when you're a teenager anything over 40 is old. It's funny how you change your mind when you reach 39 \(^3\)4 yours
