Y Care International launches emergency appeal

On 26 September, Typhoon Ketsana hit the Philippines, leading to flash floods and landslides. The Typhoon also affected the wider region, including Vietnam. Early October, a major earthquake hit western Sumatra, claiming the lives of over 1,000 people and destroying homes, roads, schools and hospitals. It is thought that more than four million people have been affected by these disasters.



Enamelled brass badge produced to promote the YMCA's 'Snapshots from Home League' of Australia, aimed to encourage amateur (and professional) photographers to provide images of soldier's loved ones at home. The YMCA, which accompanied Australian troops close to the front line, produced forms on which troops could request an image of their family. Amateur photographers were then contacted in the relevant local regions in Australia who arranged to meet families, take portraits and were encouraged to provide free processing of the images and free prints.

The programme was advertised in newspapers, early photographic magazines and photographic shops as well as YMCA depots; above is an example of one of the posters which were produced to promote the League's activities. The scheme was initiated in England and soon spread throughout the British Empire. It was so successful that it was repeated during the Second World War.

THE FOVANT BADGES

When the 1914-1918 war broke out, there was a need to find accommodation for the New Army. In many areas, training and transit camps were established for troops leaving for, and returning from, the battlefields in northern France. One of these areas was the village of Fovant, in Wiltshire and its neighbours Compton Chamberlayne and Sutton Mandeville. The villages and the fields in the shadow of the chalk downs became a military camp, complete with barracks, a hospital, parade areas, shooting practice ranges, a camp cinema and YMCA huts. A military railway was constructed to serve the camp, branching off the main line railway from London to the southwest

Thousands of men from all parts of Britain and overseas lived for a while in the area, passed on to the Western Front and returned from it. Many never returned but gave their lives on the battlefields in France. Others died of their wounds in the hospital or from disease. Rows of silent War Graves in Fovant and other nearby churchyards are testimony to their presence. In remembrance of their colleagues, many of the regiments carved into the hillside replicas of their cap badges. Many of these no longer survive, but by the end of WW1 there were some twenty discernible badges.



Local workers from Fovant and the surrounding villages, supported by Regimental Associations maintained the Badges after WWI. During WWII, the badges became overgrown in order to disguise landmarks, which might assist enemy aircraft. Weather and time, as well as the effects of grazing cattle, caused decay. After the end of WWII, the Fovant Home Guard platoons formed themselves into an Old Comrades Association and undertook the task of restoration. It was in the period of 1948/51 that the two Wiltshire regimental badges were cut and in 1970 the Royal Signals badge was added.

In 1961, the Old Comrades Association was reformed as 'The Fovant Badges Society' with redefined, more positive objectives related to the maintenance and preservation of the Badges and the holding of the annual Drumhead Service.

By 2000, there were only twelve discernible badges on the downs. A new management structure was put in place and, in consultation with professional civil engineers, a survey of the condition of the badges was made. It appeared that the Fovant Badges were unique in their detail and posed difficult restoration problems relating to the slope of the hill, the complexity of design, and their sizes. These vary; the Australian Badge, the largest, measures 51m x 32m, which is just under half the area of a football pitch.

The Trustees, faced with a potential bill of £350,000 upwards for restoration and large annual sums for increased maintenance thereafter, realised that the task facing them had to be brought to realistic proportions. They decided, with much sadness, that the objective should be the restoration and maintenance of the military crests on Fovant Down. These are clearly visible from a lay-by in Fovant whilst passing along the A30 road between Shaftesbury and Wilton. There is also a public footpath from the road to the village of Broad Chalke, which passes by the area of the Badges. This inevitably meant that the Map of Australia on Compton Down and the crests of the Royal Warwickshire Regiment and the 7th Battalion, City of London Regiment on Sutton Down would continue their decline. These badges would, in addition, have posed intractable problems because of the nature of the ground and their more advanced state of decay. Also, the YMCA badge on Fovant Down would be allowed to fade away.

Since the badges lay on open private farmland, with the movement of cattle unrestricted, it was clearly essential that large expenditure had to be used with good effect. A crucial first step was, therefore, to ensure the long lasting protection of the Badges. In co-operation with the farm owners, application was made to English Heritage to have the Badges scheduled as Ancient Monuments. Scheduling was granted in 2001 by the Department of Culture, Media and Sport placing all twelve badges, including those not being restored, under the protection of the government.

The estimated cost of the more limited objective was £220,000 and a national appeal was formally launched at the annual Drumhead Service in July 2001. The response to this was very positive and sufficient sums were assured by the end of 2001 to allow work to commence in 2002. Work experience by contractors, Dean and Dyball Construction Ltd, Ringwood, and favourable weather in 2002 allowed more work than anticipated to be done. This led to five badges being restored in 2002 and the remaining three (including the Royal Signals Badge who undertake their own maintenance and restoration) were completed in 2003.

TRIBUTE TO BARBARA VESSEY

Since she first came to the town, Barbara made herself indispensable serving on numerous committees. At one time she was Vice Chair and Publications Officer to the Offa's Dyke Association, and more recently Chair of the Knighton and District Concert Society and Knighton's representative on the Heart of Wales Line Travellers' Association (HoWLTA).

Barbara did voluntary work for the National Trust and the Wildlife Trust Wales. She sang in a Ludlow choir, and was a regular contributor to the Book Club and the Poetry Group in Knighton. Gregarious, Barbara rarely talked about her own life. It is not, for instance, widely known that she was an author.

Her book 'British Boys for British Farms: the story of the YMCA farm training scheme (1932-66) was published in 1995.

Barbara will be best remembered for her great kindness. She did voluntary work in a community care home and was always ready to help those in need, be it shopping and dog walking for sick friends or ferrying people about in her car.

She had an irrepressible, matter of fact attitude to life, one that stood her in good stead during her final illness. She spoke openly and calmly to friends about her impending death, undoubtedly an example to us all. She will be greatly missed.

Dear Reg, I would be delighted and willing to pay a minimum of £10 per January towards Y's Retired and Secours Spexiaux!

I enjoy the Newsletter. Ann and I have been busy this year. We began the year in Tenerife soaking up some winter sun and some winter rain. In May we trekked up 10,000 ft to Gorang in Nepal and then also immediately spent three weeks in our camper van in Pembrokeshire. In September we are off to Kefalonia – busy times. We are very involved in our parish life; running Bible Study, lay Reading, and occasionally preaching.

I am still the Chairman of our local parish community shop which has been going 17 years now and contributes about £20,000 each year to the village life around here.

Also on retirement, I established with two friends a business called Canllaw – which is Welsh for 'Guide.' We have established 120 cyber centres throughout Wales. Funding from the EU has ceased, but we are negotiating an 80 centre cybercafé network throughout Wales with a total spend of £8 million.

Report of the Reunion of the Y's Retired of the UK - 2009

All of us would remember those days when on returning from the AOS/APS or National Assembly, we were enthused and invigorated for all things YMCA. The times of praying together, meeting up with colleagues from across the land and even further afield, those meaningful conversations in the bar where the exchange of stories of being with our backs to the wall when God intervened and the impending risk became a roaring certainty, the driving imperative that what we were engaged in was all about lives being changed. All this sent us back to work with a renewed vigour and an enthusiasm that we were a people called to a particular work – God's work.

And then came retirement.....

And so it was that Y's Retired President, Jim Lamb brought us together once more to perhaps reminisce and enjoy each other's company. Yet there was so much more to experience during our time together at the Woodbrooke Quaker Study Centre, Birmingham, (an inspired choice). It reminded us that once called, always called. An experience that was further enhanced by ministry from the Rev Tony Malcolm, formerly Christian Education Director and now qualifying as a Y's retired.

The opportunity to meet with today's young executives Jim Jenkinson, Region Executive Officer, Clive Yates, CEO from Sutton Coldfield and Alan Fraser, CEO of Birmingham who were driven by the same motives and the same creative energies as we were. They face the same challenges of either taking the money or retaining their YMCA integrity, rising to the challenge and taking the gamble or playing it safe. What was particularly encouraging was that these men were all for facing the challenge and staying true to their calling.

This led the assembled group neatly into the discussion "would we recommend the YMCA to a young person as a career" and of course the answer had to be an overwhelming yes. The meeting with current staff was a delight to delegates and I like to think it served to encourage them to know they were maintaining the mission that had inspired generations of YMCA staff. The question the encounter left us with was, is our role finished at the point of retirement, is there a further contribution we can make in retirement? (without getting in the way of course)

In the session on "what are we doing in our retirement" it was illuminating to see how many of the retired were still making a contribution to the local YMCA or serving the church and local community in some way or other. On the first night the epilogue concluded with the text "let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in Heaven. It would seem that the light still shines in the Y's Retired because once called always called. Our renewed enthusiasm was further enhanced by a visit to the YMCA Archives arranged by Sam Johnston and Roger Hunt. To look at photographs and hear again the stories of self sacrifice that marked out so much of YMCA history, was for some a very moving experience and a further visit is recommended.

Birmingham University staff were able to show us the new air condition temperature controlled environment where all this history will be kept in future. They obviously value it and so should we, after all, our pictures and our history were part of the collection.

Of course we could not meet without considering the future of the Y's Retired, but it is evident that through the Newsletter and the various regional meetings it had an important role to play, not least in supporting Secours Speciaux working on behalf of our poorer colleagues throughout the world who struggle without proper pension provision. And the only way we could secure the future was to have the right systems in place.

As a result time was found to conduct some formal business. Ray Allen was confirmed as Honorary Treasurer and the annual fee increased to £10 with £5 going to Secours Speciaux. In future the accounts will be with the National Westminster Bank with the Treasurer and Secretary, Reg Wake being the two cheque signatories In future there will be opportunity for members to pay by Standing Order and details will appear in the Newsletter.

The retiring collection for Secours Speciaux amounted to £127 which when added to the balance left over from the conference of £43.25 amounted to £170.25 so thank you one and all.

In closing

Over the four days much of our thinking had been with those we served with and who had inspired us to reach out to do great things. Numbered among them was Fredrik Franklin Secretary General at the World Alliance. In our closing devotions Jim Thompson who during this period served with Fredrik for four years, was able to quote from a speech the great man gave to a British Secretaries conference in 1964.

"We are called to be fellow workmen with the best that is in others. Ours is the opportunity to learn from Jesus the art of seeing not only what is, but what could be. Ours is the function to look for, discover and develop the gifts of leadership, capacity for friendship, ability to win a game or lose it gracefully. Ours is the function to help discover the enjoyment of the simple things in life as well as the horrors of injustice, deprivation, oppression."

MINUTES

Extraordinary meeting of the Y's Retired of the UK Held at the Quaker Study Centre, Selly Oak Wednesday, 23rd September, 2009.

1. Present:

Jim Lamb (Presiding) Reg Wake (Secretary) Ray Allen (Hon.Treasurer) Eddie Brady, Peter Brookes, Alex Cloke, Fred Daldry, Gilbert Dickson, Paul Harper, Pat Haworth (Mrs), Ted Milburn, Stephen and Hanna Milner, Brian Rowcliffe, Leslie Evenden (Mrs), Jim and Mary Thomson.

2. Purpose:

The President explained the need for formal Resolutions to facilitate revised banking arrangements required following the death of former Treasurer, the late Geoffrey Harris, and sought ratification of action taken by the Executive officers.

3. Accounts:

- a) "That the appointment of Mr. Ray Allen as Honorary Treasurer of the Y's Retired of the UK be ratified."
- b) "That the Y's Retired of the UK bank account be transferred from the Halifax Building Society (Watford Branch) to the National Westminster Bank (Lincoln Branch.
- c) "That the two signatories, either one of whom to act in transactions with the National Westminster Account, be those of Ray Allen, and Reg Wake, Honorary Treasurer and Honorary Secretary respectively.

Having been duly proposed and seconded, the Resolutions as defined were warmly <u>endorsed.</u>

4. Subscriptions and Donations:

Following the suggestion of Arthur Bennett as published in the Newsletter of September 2009 and invited responses from the wider membership, the following Resolution was proposed, seconded and <u>agreed.</u>

"That the annual subscription, payable as at 1st January, be increased to £10 with £5. recorded as membership subscription and £5.00 (or optional addition) recorded as a donation to Secours Speciaux."

A related suggestion was considered, supported and agreed. Viz.

"An optional method of payment of subscriptions and donations through Standing Order in favour of the Y's Retired of the UK may be made. <u>David Smith</u> to prepare and publish through the Newsletter a pro-forma 'Instruction to personal Bank Manager of members."

6. Current Assets:

Pending final closure of the Halifax Building Society account, Reg Wake reported a provisional credit balance of approximately £4,000 with standing subventions payable in 2009 of £100.00 to WFYR and £100.00 to Secours Speciaux plus notional office expenses for 2009 of say £100.00. Member donations to Secours Speciaux reserved £180. Noted.

During discussion, it was suggested that executive officers consider an increase in the current subvention in favour of Scours Speciaux. The suggestion was favourably <u>supported</u> and referred for attention.

7. Discretionary Fund:

The President reported an anonymous donation of some £500.00 intended to further the interests of the Y's Retired.

In wide discussion, no immediate and specific usage was identified but note taken of possible avenues such as assistance with travel and/or relief of acute financial difficulties faced by a member or his/her dependents. It was accepted that the fund would need substantial addition to be effective as a Trust Fund rather as a Discretionary Fund.

It was <u>agreed</u> that the donation be held as a Discretionary Fund and that the President and Secretary would develop criteria for use of the fund to be administered at their discretion.

8. Secours Speciaux:

_It had been reported that voluntary donations received in the financial year to date were substantially in excess of previous years and seen to be very encouraging. It was <u>agreed</u> that opportunity be taken for a retiring collection at close of the Reunion.

Thoughts of 90 year old Jim Grey brings back most happy memories of a true Christian Gentleman whose smile lightened many a personal conversation and eased pressure on any over formal YMCA meetings.

His contribution to the YMCA measured of the best in service and devotion to his work as many a young person (now old!) would testify due to Jim's influence in their lives. No task was too great, no problem whether human or business was unsolvable as his many colleagues and friends would testify.

There was an endearing human quality touched with humour as I recall two incidents when a group of young YMCA Secretaries gathered at the entrance to the old City of Leeds YMCA in Albion Place before embarking on an educational visit to an International Conference at the world renowned YMCA Centre at Castle Mainau in Switzerland. The group having supposedly deposited their luggage in the boots of two taxis, one taxi reversed to the sound of a bang and grating which when checked there was found Jim's suitcase absent-mindedly left at the rear of the taxi, burst open and belongings scattered everywhere – we roared with laughter! The second occasion was on the same journey arriving at Heathrow Airport and passing through automatic opening doors (They had just been installed and were a new phenomenon of modern electronics!). We lost Jim later found walking in and out for some 10/12 times of the ever opening doors with a somewhat battered suitcase disbelieving such miracles! Our time at Castle Mainau was much enhanced by Jim's presence.

Jim and Margaret were firm supporters of the Y's Retired of the UK not least the Anglia Y's Retired two meetings a year for lunch and socialising in different venues whilst health allowed. In his long retirement he remained the same Jim – a friend, a fine conversationalist, one who would always go the extra mile, and one whose anecdotes shared about his life in the YMCA brought merriment. Letters received during his later years spoke highly of his family and their support at that time.
